2011 Legislative Reports

Budgets are reporting out to House Appropriations and the Senate Finance Committees, usually a sure sign that the Idaho Legislature is gathering momentum. In this case, the hard decisions have yet to be made. The two biggest budgets, public education and Health & Welfare, have not been set. There is still a revenue deficit and it is unclear whether the legislature will choose additional funding cuts or raise taxes/fees to meet its constitutional mandate to adopt a balanced budget.

Two new pieces of water legislation have been printed relating to water leases for hydropower purposes in local water banks and rental pools (HO272) and ground water assessments as liens for bonding/mitigation purposes (HO273).

Idaho Water Resource Board met last week in Boise and created an Upper Snake Advisory Committee. The Committee's main purpose will be to advise the Board on water releases upstream of Milner Dam for hydropower generation. The Committee will consist of appointed representatives from the Bureau of Reclamation, IWRB, Idaho Power Company, the Committee of Nine, and other special interests.

The draft Rathdrum Prairie Comprehensive Aquifer Management Plan (CAMP) was adopted by the Board. Public hearings will be held in Coeur d'Alene in May in conjunction with the Board's meeting there.

Idaho Water Supply Committee forecasts a promising water supply for the state. Overall snowpack and stream flows are in normal to above normal ranges. A disappointing January was offset by stormy conditions in late February and March that are rebuilding lower elevation snowpacks. High elevation sites continue to look good. There are pockets of higher and lower precipitation around the state, but overall the forecast remains positive.

The Pacific Northwest Power & Conservation Council also met in Boise last week. Three presentations of note included panel discussions on Idaho Energy Policy, IPCO's planning issues, and the Residential Exchange Program. With respect to energy policy, panelist Paul Kjellander advised the Council to expect fundamental changes in the ways we produce and consume energy. A regional perspective is important to energy decisions since so much of the power used in Idaho is produced outside the state or on its borders. The other panelist Ric Gale/Idaho Power said there is "no silver bullet; silver buckshot is the answer" to energy planning. *Continued on page 7*

Later Mark Stokes (also Idaho Power) would concur with Gale's comments that energy planning must combine demand side management and supply side resources. Wind integration is an issue that Idaho Power and Bonneville Power Administration are addressing. It is both a question of how to integrate the sizeable amounts of wind coming onto these systems, the cost to integrate, and the impact of those costs on rates and ratepayers. Jim Tucker discussed similar concerns with respect to hydropower upgrades, primarily Hells Canyon Complex. Relicensing costs at Hells Canyon are close to half a billion dollars. The relicensing process has been stalled since 2006 over two issues: Clean Water Act 40l certification standards and Endangered Species Act consultations for anadromous fish and bull trout. Until these issues are resolved, no draft Environmental Impact Statement can be completed.

An on-going dispute over the Residential Exchange Program may be ending. A proposed settlement agreement was negotiated between over 100 stakeholders last year. Investor-owned and public power utilities in the Pacific Northwest along with the public utilities commissions in Idaho, Oregon and Washington and other stakeholders have until April 15th to sign a mediated settlement agreement. If the stakeholders agree, then Bonneville Power Administration has until August 1st to sign the agreement.

The Residential Exchange Program allocates the benefits of the federal hydropower between public and private utilities. If signed, the settlement agreement could resolve legal challenges and offers the region's ratepayers greater certainty over how REP payments and benefits are distributed.

Paul Kjellander, Administrator of the Idaho Office of Energy Resources, has been reappointed to the Idaho Public Utilities Commission, replacing Jim Kempton who is retiring.
