CURTAILMENT PROPOSED IN WD 130 &140

IGWA's attempts to deliver the required 1.99 cfs to Snake River Farms per the Director's Order fell short despite numerous attempts to mediate a settlement between ground and spring water users. Spring users have thwarted or rejected every attempt to comply with the Director's Order leaving him with no other alternative but to curtail 41,000 acres in the Magic Valley.

Over the last two and a half years, IGWA has attempted to provide water, drill wells, purchase aquaculture rights, install aeration, pumping and filtration facilities to recirculate water, dry up lands, and compensate for or replace lost fish production to mitigate the 1.99 cfs. Because the Director does not believe he has the legal authority to approve compensation as an alternative to water unless both parties agree, he instructed Water Master Cindy Yenter to mail curtailment letter last week.

IGWA continues to work with the Department, legislature, disputants and other parties to resolve the issue. Tuthill will appear before the Senate Resource & Environment Committee this afternoon to discuss his Curtailment Order.

New Water Board Appointees: Last week the Idaho Water Board gained two new members when Governor Otter appointed Vince Alberdi, Twin Falls, and Roger Chase, Pocatello, to replace Vic Armacost and Claude Storer.

CAMP HEARING: Representative Bert Stevenson, chairman of the House Resource & Conservation Committee, will hold a public hearing on House Bill 210—**CAMP**—in Room 148 on Wednesday, March 11, 2009, starting at 1:30 p.m. In recent weeks some opposition to the CAMP process has surfaced, primarily from surface water users in the Upper Valley and on the Committee of Nine. IGWA members will attend the hearing to speak in support of CAMP.
